A phonological disorder is a speech sound disorder that affects

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the PHONOLOGICAL (phonemic) level. The child has difficulty organizing their speech sounds into a system of sound patterns (phonemic patterns). The difference between an Articulation and a Phonological disorder; An articulation disorder is the child's difficulty at a phonetic/motoric level. They have trouble making the individual speech sounds.

Articulation and phonology ( fon-ol-oji) refer to the way sound is produced. A child with an articulation disorder has problems forming speech sounds properly. A child with a phonological disorder can produce the sounds correctly, but may use them in the
