Taste small, young, well-cooked bits before digging in. Specimens growing on several species of tree (pine, juniper, spruce, hemlock, eucalyptus, locust, fir, or tamarack) are particularly suspect - avoid them. If you can't identify the tree for sure because it's dead, play it safe and skip the 'shroom.

Roots are best when shredded/sliced and soaked in water for 5-10 minutes to reduce harshness. White pith of young flower stalks is edible raw. Varieties in the Pacific Northwest are Common burdock (*Arctium minus*) and Woolly burdock (*Arctium tomentosum*). Look for burdock on disturbed soil sites.
