On May 10, the Pain Management Best Practices Inter-Agency Task Force voted on its final recommendations, which emphasize the importance of providing balanced, individualized, patient-centered pain management to ensure better clinical outcomes for pain that improve quality of life and functionality for patients.

Patient-Centered Care Is Key to Best Practices in Pain ...

Effective management of acute pain results in improved patient outcomes and increased patient satisfaction. Although research and advanced treatments in improved practice protocols have documented progressive improvements in management of acute and postoperative pain, little awareness of the effectiveness of best practices persists.

Effective Pain Management and Improvements in Patients ...

Discussing outcomes and offering multimodal interventions can go a long way toward positive outcomes. The success of medical treatments, particularly those for chronic pain, depend in some degree on the expectations of the patient. But the provider's expectations and communications to the patient about those expectations matter, too.

Patient and Provider Expectations Influence Pain Treatment ...

One of the challenges of working as a clinician with people in pain is measuring outcomes. Pain is an experience, and as a result, it cannot be directly measured. Instead, we use surrogate measures like a VAS, McGill Pain Questionnaire and functional assessments to make an assessment of the severity of someone's complaint.

What Is A Good Outcome In Pain Management? - Beyond ...

Assessment is the first step in managing pain. It helps ensure that the patient receives effective pain relief. Observe for nonverbal indicators of pain: moaning, guarding, crying, facial grimace. Some patients may deny the existence of pain. These behaviors can help with proper evaluation of pain. Accept the patient's description of pain.

Patient describes satisfactory pain control at a level less than 3 to 4 on a rating scale of 0 to 10. Patient displays improved well-being such as baseline levels for pulse, BP, respirations, and relaxed muscle tone or body posture. Patient uses pharmacological and nonpharmacological pain-relief strategies.

Assessing Clinical Outcomes: Patient Satisfaction with ...

Functional outcomes Chronic pain requires intensive, activity-oriented, behavioral treatment. Individuals with chronic pain often lead a sedentary lifestyle that may result in musculoskeletal deterioration. Physical conditioning focuses on increasing strength, while decreasing pain, improving self-esteem and enhancing overall health.

For example, the well-documented reduction in postoperative ileus when a continuous thoracic epidural with local anesthetics is administered for pain control after major intraabdominal surgery does not lead to improved patient outcomes (e.g., decreased major complications) or reduced hospital stay unless the patient is encouraged to rapidly resume oral intake and begins to ambulate in the early postoperative period (6).

The Pain Assessment Screening Tool and Outcomes Registry (PASTOR) is an IM/IT capability being developed in the Military Health System to provide clinicians with pain-related patient reported outcomes and a clinical decision making tool.
