We use lose, not miss, when we no longer have something because we don't know where it is or because it has been taken away: She doesn't want to lose her job. Not: She doesn't want to miss her job. We use miss, not lose, to refer to being too late for something or for not being somewhere that we need to be: I missed the bus. Not: I lost the bus.

The word Miss is a short form that originated from the word Mistress in the 1600s. Ms (used in UK) or Ms. (used in North America and Ireland) is a title used with the last name or full name of women. The usage of this title began early, at the same time when "Miss" came into usage but gained popularity only by the 20th century.

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
