• Tuvalu faces an existential threat: a rising tide and more frequent and intense rainfall events threaten to sink the nation in 30 to 50 years. The United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change predicts a 0.9 metres (3 feet) increase in global sea levels by 2100—degrading up to one meter of Tuvalu's shoreline per year. In Tuvalu specifically, the rise in sea level will increase by up to 18 centimetres (0.6 feet) by 2030.
